3. Our own experience

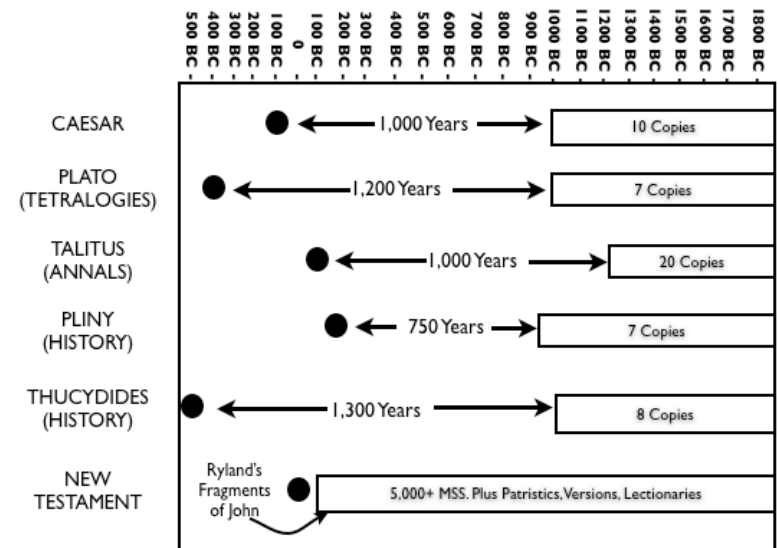
B. What does the bible say about itself?
